The Blog aims to provide an accessible forum for education, thought, and discussion about the unprecedented actions by governments across Canada and elsewhere in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. What jurisdictional issues are at stake? How can the *Charter* section breaches be justified? What powers can a government assume and what are the limits of those powers in a 'health emergency'?

Post lengths should be approximately 1,200 to 1,500 words, written in plain language, where possible. Posts should include footnotes.
